THE KEYSTONE Network

The Keystone network of agencies is comprised of many different companies. First, we are Keystone Blind Association (KBA), located in Hermitage PA, the original organization established in 1947 to provide services to blind and visually impaired persons in our community. We offer many services in Mercer, Crawford, Lawrence in PA and in Mahoning and Trumbull Counties in Ohio. Our services include Specialized Services (transportation with sighted guide, assistance with grocery shopping, life skills, support groups, etc.), Orientation and Mobility Instruction, Vision Rehabilitation Therapy, Assistive Technology, Prevention of Blindness screenings and programs, Keystone Kids/Young Adults programs, and employment opportunities in document destruction, toilet paper manufacture and employment at PennDOT rest areas. In addition to our Hermitage Headquarters, we operate offices in New Castle and Meadville, PA.

Second, we are Keystone Vocational Services (KVS), developed in 1998 to provide employment opportunities exclusively to people who are visually impaired. These opportunities include manufacturing products and providing services to the Federal government through the Ability One Program, where at least 75% of the direct labor force must be legally blind. Examples are the digging and striking tool manufacturing programs and the hardhat (helmet) manufacturing program. KVS also provides shredding services to the local community and runs a federal mailroom for the Office of Personal Management.

Third, we are Keystone Independence Management (KIM), formed in 2000 to provide management and backoffice services to Keystone Blind Association and to Keystone Vocational Services. KIM provides all accounting and payroll services, human resource functions, program development, fundraising, and administration for KBA and KVS. In 2006 KIM began providing management and backoffice services to the Beaver County Association for the Blind (BCAB) in Beaver Falls. The Center for the Blind and Visually Impaired (CBVI) and the Center for the Blind and Disabled (CBD) in Delaware County near Philadelphia began to receive management and back-office services from KIM in 2009. Finally, in 2012, the Montgomery County Association for the Blind (MCAB), also near Philadelphia, began to participate in the KIM program.

Though on opposite ends of the state, KBA and its network of agencies work together to provide a variety of services and products to not only the individuals of Pennsylvania, but also to the federal government.





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Individual Development through Experience, Assessment, and Learning IDEAL Summer 2018 - July 8th through August 3rd

A transition program for students ages 15 to 21 with vision loss. One-on-one life skills training • Computer/Access Technology instruction • Transition planning (pre-college and job readiness) • Residential living – on-site dormitory • Social Development

Students who have a visual impairment or blindness may need to sharpen their life and work skills to prepare to make the transition from a school setting and living at home to the workplace, further education, and independent living. The Individual Development through Experience, Assessment and Learning summer program, better known as IDEAL, is designed to assist students in making these transitions.

IDEAL is a full immersion, four-week summer program at the Center for the Blind and Visually Impaired (CBVI). IDEAL was designed to address the various transition challenges facing blind and visually impaired teens. Furthering education, enhanced productivity in work and successful independent living are the goals set forth for students in the IDEAL program. These goals are encouraged and achieved through support and good transition planning by IDEAL instructors, the student's counselors and family members.

Throughout the IDEAL program, students live dormitory style at the Center. Days, nights and week-ends are filled with activities that cultivate independence needed for adult living.

The program is unique in that students undergo a careful initial assessment, allowing instructors to tailor the curriculum toward each student's individual needs and goals. Daytime classes include instruction in home management, computer access technology, vocational assessment and career exploration, orientation and mobility, and communications.

Home management class emphasizes all the skills necessary for independent living. Cooking, doing laundry, cleaning, bill paying, banking, and organizational skills, are just some of the key elements that are covered during home management. While attending the computer access technology class students are introduced to the most up to date assistive technology for use in the classroom or the work-place. In addition, the instructors also teach the students in all Apple products in CBVI's Apple Lab.

During the vocational assessment and career exploration class, students receive college and career guidance and information. Instruction in the use of the white cane, orientation to sidewalks and street crossings and access to public transportation are the main points covered during the orientation and mobility class. Lastly, students are able to enhance their Braille and keyboarding skills, and work with academic remediation as needed.

Throughout the course of the IDEAL program, students are able to visit places of employment with opportunity for discussion with employers. The students also spend time at nearby colleges to gain insight and information on college life.

With dining out, movies, bowling and mall trips in the evening and field trips to cultural events, amusement parks and area points of interest on weekends, there is plenty of time set aside for fun. The program provides a unique opportunity for students to bond with other blind and visually impaired teens, to share feelings and ideas, and to form fast and lasting friendships.

At the conclusion of the summer program, the staff invites family members, counselors, and educators to meet with each participant to discuss his or her progress during the program. The group then develops plans and recommendations which facilitate an effective transition into college life or the workplace for the student.

AN OVERVIEW OF VISION LOSS

If you are reading this, I would imagine that you are interested in understanding vision loss and what can be done to minimize the effects of that loss so that quality of life can be optimized. Because this is the first of a series of articles covering various topics related to low vision rehabilitation, a brief introductory overview of vision loss and its implications will help to set the stage for future articles.

Some types of vision loss are transient, while some diseases that cause vision loss can be treated and

vision can be improved. However, some disease processes are not treatable with conventional medications or surgery, so that the vision loss the disease creates is permanent. Fortunately, with advances in medicine, more ocular diseases can be treated to minimize vision loss. For example, there are two types of age-related macular degeneration: dry and wet. Heretofore, wet macular degeneration (which is fortunately less prevalent than dry macular degeneration) could only be treated with laser and, while that helped, it left scars that affected vision. Now, however, there are ocular injections which can slow down, stop, or in some cases, even reverse wet macular degeneration, which in

visual impairment which is not amenable to medical treatment, surgery, or conventional eyeglasses or contact lenses and they will likely find it difficult or impossible to do some visual tasks that were done prior to the vision loss. This can ultimately impact quality of life because of the resulting frustration and depression. Fortunately, on the continuum of recognized mainstream treatments for vision loss, there is vision rehabilitation, a way to systematically assess the functional impact of a vision loss and then to use optical,

> non-optical, electro optical, and virtual reality approaches to maximize remaining vision, with the ultimate goal of maintaining the ability to do visual activities of daily living. As with any rehabilitation, low vision rehabilitative treatment is done with active participation on the part of the person with a vision loss and is not something done to that person, like surgery. And because of that, oftentimes success is based on that person's desire to work through the challenges of achieving a goal with what might be considered "unconventional" devices to help with that process. So the most important take-home message for the vast majority of individuals who have been told "nothing more can be

turn can minimize the devastating effects of vision loss. But as with most treatments, timing is important. Having said that, what about those people who have ophthalmic diseases for which treatment is minimally effective or not effective at all? These people are considered to have low vision or a done" to achieve visual goals, is that this message is incorrect. So, with that as an introduction, the next article will describe a low vision rehabilitative assessment, which is the beginning of the process for determining what options are available for improving visual function.



IS YOUR FAVORITE COLOR 'WHITE'?

White better be your favorite color if you work or reside in the northwest region of the state. The snowfall so far this season has been what you would call significant and has broken a few records.

As of January 10th more than 11 feet of snow has fallen in Erie, which made it the snowiest city in the United States so far this winter. A stalled lake effect storm provided a 'White Christmas' with setting the all-time record for twoday snowfall in the state of Pennsylvania: 60.5 inches (Dec. 25-26). Erie's average season is 100.9 inches of snowfall and their snowiest season on record occurred in 2000-01 with 149.1 inches. So with a little more than 16 inches left in the remaining half of the season that record will be topped.

Our employees at the interstate rest area locations in the Erie area, facing these extreme conditions, are dedicated to their jobs every day of the year! In addition to the Erie area, our employee's at rest area all over the state of PA have faced more snowfall this year than in recent years. They work every day to assure there is a safe haven for travelers from one season to the next – our sincere gratitude to them!

KEYSTONE KIDS

The Keystone Kids program is a community-based instructional program that is designed for children ages 6-21 with a visual impairment. Through a variety of fun and educational experiences, this program promotes personal growth and independence for children who are blind and visually impaired.

What better way to supplement a child's education than with fun? Well that's what we do, we have fun learning. Keystone Kids is held throughout the school year focusing around different independent living skills. Each event incorporates learned skills without the students realizing; ranging from crossing a street to budgeting a meal. In addition, there are week-long summer programs both for young students and high school students. The high school students focus on transitioning from the safety of the school setting into a college setting, the work force, or to living independently. The younger students learn about the world around them experiencing activities they may have never done before.

This program is free to the students and most often these students are provided transportation.

YOUNG ADULTS

As we grow, we learn to be independent, to establish our own opinions, values, and goals; this is an important process for every person. To be independent is to be selfsufficient, minimally relying on others to assist in general activities of daily living. This is no different for those who are visually impaired. As a visually impaired young person, there will be certain things for which you will have to rely on others. However, at KBA, we encourage our young adults to learn the skills necessary to be as independent as possible.

Although the young adults program at KBA gives individuals a great opportunity for socialization and recreation, one of the main goals of this program is to assist them to become as independent as possible. Some of the areas we cover are communication, technology, cooking, cleaning, orientation and mobility, organization, money management, transportation, and self-advocating.

All of these skills are important to help an individual with a visual impairment get through each day. Young adults come to an age-appropriate group activity that focuses on these skills. Activities include making dinner, playing adaptive games, bowling, skating, snow tubing, movie night and camping. Each activity skills utilizes different daily living with the ultimate goal of learning to be self-reliant.
